POLICY

DEFINITIONS

These definitions apply to these terms as they are used in this policy.

Copyright

As defined by U.S. Copyright Office – Circular 1 entitled "Copyright Basics" – "Copyright is a form of protection provided by the laws of the United States (title 17, U. S. Code) to the authors of 'original works of authorship,' including literary, dramatic, musical, artistic, and certain other intellectual works. This protection is available to both published and unpublished works."

Fair Use

A <u>limitation</u> under 17 U.S.C. 107 to the <u>exclusive right</u> granted by <u>copyright</u> law to the author of a creative work, allowing limited use of copyrighted material without acquiring permission from the rights holders. Examples of fair are criticism, commentary, news reporting, scholarship or research. Determination of fair use involves consideration under a four-factor <u>balancing test</u>.
